Imani Gandy: Hello, fellow law nerds. Welcome to another episode of Boom! Lawyered, a Rewire News Group podcast hosted by the legal journalism team that bows down to Gen Z. Bow down to Gen Z. I'm Rewire News Group's editor-at-large, Imani Gandy.

Jess Pieklo: And I'm Jess Pieklo, Rewire News Group's executive editor. Rewire News Group is the one and only home for expert repo journalism that inspires you to thank a Gen Z voter today. And the Boom! Lawyered Podcast is part of that mission. So a big thanks to our subscribers, and a welcome to our new listeners and viewers. Wait, hold on a second. We-why are we in sepia tone? Imani?

Imani Gandy: Oh, yeah.

Jess Pieklo: Why do you look so old timey? What's going on?

Imani Gandy: Well, because we're about to talk about some real old-timey shit, right, like some pre-Civil War abortion-related stuff. So just, you know, I mean, I wore my, like, I mean, I tried to dress as Civil War, pre-Civil War as possible, nice dress, pearls, the whole nine. Although, you know, I like the-

Jess Pieklo: I mean, you look gorgeous.

Imani Gandy: I mean, honestly, I think I do. Thank you very much but yeah, let's talk about some old timey shit, Jess.

Jess Pieklo: I, okay, hold, we, yeah, but I, I'm in a Wisconsin Badgers T-shirt. I look decidedly less gorgeous and glam than what you have going on, I thought we were talking about Wisconsin.

Imani Gandy: We love, love the Wisconsin gear. You look fabulous and-Buc-ee forever. We are talking about Wisconsin stuff and pre-Civil War, old timey stuff, so let's get into it.

Jess Pieklo: Oh, all right. Okay, so last week, progressives won big in Wisconsin, right, Janet Protasiewicz, did I get it?

Imani Gandy: You got it. Well done.

Jess Pieklo: First take folks. This woman defeated Daniel Kelly for the Wisconsin Supreme Court seat by about ten points, right? 55 to 45 percent, according to NBC. This cements a four to three liberal majority on the Wisconsin Supreme Court. It's the first time in 15 years that the court will have a liberal majority. And given the rights that are on the line in Wisconsin in this country, this is huge.

Imani Gandy: It is so huge, I mean, we got abortion rights on the line. We've got voting rights on the line, right? Wisconsin is gerrymandered to the hilt. We've got trans rights on the line. We've

even got clean water and air on the line. The Supreme Court race in Wisconsin was absolutely critical, and Republicans knew it.

Jess Pieklo: They did. And what happened? Republicans lost big. They got pantsed, as Imani said on Twitter. They got pantsed. They poured millions into this election and Gen Z just straight up outflanked them. And that's what we're gonna talk about today, the Wisconsin Supreme Court election, and why it's such a big deal that progressive organizers led by a bunch of whipper snappers who sure as hell have a lot more energy than you and I do. How they took back the Wisconsin Supreme Court and how generally you might be able to help take back courts in your state.

Imani Gandy: It's very exciting. It's very exciting. So let's talk about that first thing we're gonna talk about today, which is the human rights on the line in Wisconsin, human rights on the line in Wisconsin. The top line of the election is in Wisconsin, the Supreme Court will now likely strike down Wisconsin's 19th century abortion ban.

Jess Pieklo: I'm sorry, did you just say 19th century?

Imani Gandy: 19th century abortion ban. Wisconsin has an abortion ban from the year 1849, yeah, that's right, you heard me.

Jess Pieklo: 1849?

Imani Gandy: 1849. That's pre-Civil War, right?

Jess Pieklo: Yeah.

Imani Gandy: And because of the Dobbs decision, right? The horrible Dobbs decision that we just, we're still living with the repercussions of, well, that ban was resurrected. I mean, it's just, it's ridiculous. So Wisconsin Attorney General Josh Kaul, filed a lawsuit challenging the law almost immediately after the court's ruling in Dobbs, right? The court's ruling in Dobbs reanimated this zombie law, this 19th century abortion ban.

Jess Pieklo: 1849.

Imani Gandy: 1840 goddamn nine. So Josh Kaul said that he had no intention of enforcing the ban. But that wouldn't have prevented local law enforcement from enforcing it.

Jess Pieklo: Yeah. I mean, good point there. Fortunately, governor Tony Evers said he would grant clemency to anyone prosecuted under the ban but also, like you've already gone through a prosecution, so thanks, Tony, that's great. But you know that, and that would've only applied for as long as both Evers and Kaul or Evers, I said Evers, as long as Evers and Kaul were in office.

So according to public, Wisconsin Public Radio, Attorney General Kaul had this to say, and this was about the chilling effect that this 1849 pre-Civil War era abortion ban like was happening, so, listen to this. "My office has begun receiving questions from sexual assault nurse examiners who are wondering whether they can still dispense emergency contraception, who are asking whether there's an exception under the 19th century abortion ban for rape and incest, the reality is, if that 19th century abortion ban remains in effect, sexual assault victims in Wisconsin will be required under Wisconsin law to carry their rapist's baby to term without medical intervention," which yikes, also good for them for calling this law out exactly as it is. The number of times he said 19th century abortion ban in one statement, thumbs up, man.

Imani Gandy: And you know, it's not just about abortion rights, right? The 19th century abortion ban is definitely the top line of the election. But other rights on the line include voting rights, right? You gotta end gerrymandering in Wisconsin. Abortion rights. Yeah. We already talked about the pre-Civil War abortion ban, right, we've got the right of trans students to use pronouns that align with their gender identity when they're in school. We've got environmental rights on the line related to holding corporate polluters accountable for their pollution. This election was huge, ginormous, humongous.

Jess Pieklo: Humongous.

Imani Gandy: Gimongous. So cut to the Wisconsin election last week, right, Milwaukee Circuit Court Judge Janet Protasiewicz. Did I get that right? As a person named Imani Gandy. I'm hoping Janet's gonna give me a little bit of grace here, right, okay. So Janet managed to beat Daniel Kelly and all of his dark money. Now, when I say all of his dark money, I mean all of his dark money. This was the most expensive judicial race in history.

Jess Pieklo: You mean Wisconsin history, right?

Imani Gandy: No, not Wisconsin history, in United States history.

Jess Pieklo: What. One seat. One seat in an off year election in Wisconsin, how, what?

Imani Gandy: Yes. I know. It's amazing that Janet P was able to win by such a large margin, it really is.

Jess Pieklo: And honestly, that's thanks to organizers in Wisconsin, specifically Gen Z organizers in Wisconsin who outflanked a a state of billionaire ding dongs functionally, right, their buckets of money, and their handpicked pine cone of a candidate.

God bless Imani for writing "pine cone of a candidate, Daniel Kelly" but look, I also want to acknowledge Wisconsin organizers in general. I'm wearing a Badger shirt for a reason, undergrad Bucky forever. I am dyed in the wool Wisconsin fan. And the state of Wisconsin, as it exists right now, is not the state of Wisconsin that I know. Do you remember 2011 Imani, lo those many years ago?

Imani Gandy: Yes.

Jess Pieklo: Wisconsin was one of the first gerrymandered states, like, to the hilt, as Imani pointed out. And as Republicans were attempting to ram through a law that would have, and eventually did bust up public unions in the state, some of the most powerful political organizing factions there, what did Wisconsin progressives do?

They occupied the goddamn capitol and they did it in protest. They ran right at one point to deny a quorum. They were doing everything they could to block Republican lawmakers from trying to ram through the nonsense that now this Supreme Court election has sort of culminated in that response. So I wanna give a shout out to that whole ecosystem, that whole life cycle of organizing. 'Cause Imani and I talk about generational change a lot on this podcast. That is an example of generational change.

Imani Gandy: And it's also an example of how, you know, state politics can inspire people to apply the same tactics to federal politics. Right? Because if you recall during the Brett Kavanaugh confirmation hearings, I was on Twitter almost on a daily basis screaming that Senate Republican, I mean, Senate Democrats should walk out of the hearings.

Don't even give those hearings any legitimacy. And I said at the time when people were saying, well, oh no, if they walk out, then that means they won't be heard and blah, blah, blah. I said, in two years, you're not even gonna remember why I'm telling them to walk out. You're not gonna remember, the point is, is you've gotta take that kind of action now. And the fact that Wisconsin Democrats just peaced the fuck out of Wisconsin, I thought that was amazing. I really did.

Jess Pieklo: Yeah.

Imani Gandy: But let's get back to this election.

Jess Pieklo: And this pine cone of a candidate.

Imani Gandy: And this pine cone of a candidate. That's the second thing we're gonna talk about today. Who the fuck is this guy?

Jess Pieklo: Bad news.

Imani Gandy: Daniel Kelly is a disciple of Pat Robertson. Now, Pat Robertson used to play all the anti-abortion hits back when he ran for president in 1988. Which for those of you who like little factoids, that's the first time that our current president, Joe Biden, ran for president, like.

Jess Pieklo: I quit.

Imani Gandy: He first ran for president in 1988, I was 14. I was 14, and now I'm 48. So that gives you a little bit of a sense of this sort of, the long arc of Joe Biden's career, right. My man is old, is what I'm saying. But he's getting it done. He's getting a lot of good stuff done. So let's just move on from that. Pat Robertson is a guy who thought that the Supreme Court doesn't make final law. Okay.

Jess Pieklo: Sure, Pat. Why not? Sounds good, Pat.

Imani Gandy: He's also a guy who, during his campaign, was spreading lies about Planned Parenthood's effort to sterilize people of color, right. To make way for the master race.

Jess Pieklo: Oh, I know you love that. That's like Imani's thing.

Imani Gandy: I mean, listen, you know how I love arguments about how Margaret Sanger was trying to individually sterilize every Black person in America, like, I love those kinds of arguments. It's a lie that will never die. I wrote the seminal piece on it. We can link it in the show notes, but it's a lie that will never die and it actually might, it might drive me to an early grave if I'm being honest but.

Jess Pieklo: No, no, we won't let it. We won't let it. The thing is, is that Daniel Kelly isn't just Pat Robertson's disciple. Okay, he went to law school at Pat Robertson's university. I love this story, hold onto your butts folks. The university shared a campus with Robertson's televangelism network, Christian Broadcasting Network, which incidentally, I was raised on CBN. It was some wild stuff, but that's an aside, guess, Imani, what his law school was called, just take a guess.

Imani Gandy: Christian Broadcasting Network University School of Law.

Jess Pieklo: Wait, stop it. How did you do that? How did you do that.

Imani Gandy: That's not what it's called. That's an absurd name for law school.

Jess Pieklo: For real, for real, for real, for real. I am not making this up. That's what it was called, Christian, look, it's in the script, it's in the script. Christian Broadcasting Network, University School of Law. Right. Okay. So obviously it was unaccredited.

Imani Gandy: Obviously. Jesus Christ. Literally. Jesus is my torts professor.

Jess Pieklo: That's literally the joke I was just gonna make. I was like, it's not law review, it's the Last Supper. Oh my God but truly, that's where Daniel Kelly learned his regressive views about how God belongs in the law. This is what he had to say. I'm sure this is gonna be great: "to the inevitable objection that the law of nature and nature's God could not possibly have anticipated such topics as corporate taxation, antitrust suits, or"-I can barely get through this without absolutely cracking up-"or the constitutional incorporation doctrine." "And every legal question

must rest on some foundational premise. And that premise must stand the test of measurement against the law of nature and nature's God," Imani.

Imani Gandy: What the shit? Like, honestly, what the shit? Yeah, 'cause everybody knows, God loves piercing that corporate veil, like, I mean, he loves, stick it in and pierce it.

Jess Pieklo: Imani's making a corporate law sex joke for the folks who might not.

Imani Gandy: I apologize, actually, I don't, I stand in my joke and in my truth as a Black woman. But, like, if you're, he's talking about, you know, measuring law against of nature's God and all that, that sounds very Amy Coney Barrett of him, doesn't it?

Jess Pieklo: Oh, it sure does. I mean, your legal career is but a means to an end, and that end is but building the kingdom of God.

Imani Gandy: Oh, sweet Jesus. Every time you do that, I swear I get chills. I get chills. It's chilling. God, get it together, Gandy, okay. Unsurprisingly-

Jess Pieklo: I'm sorry, but what the fuck is "God contemplating corporate taxation?" I'm just like imagining, like, honestly, I picture like Kurt Russell in Guardians of the Galaxy Two.

Imani Gandy: Oh, God. Oh, God, yeah. Oh my God. Just the whole kingdom, I feel like we didn't talk enough about the justice kingdom of God nonsense, right? Like, she's something else. Our favorite right wing Pam Beasley, okay, moving on. Unsurprisingly, Wisconsin Right to Life, Wisconsin Family Action, and Pro-Life Wisconsin all backed Daniel Kelly. In addition, according to reporting from Evan Vorpahl at Truthout, there were at least five different front groups that have been heavily funded by a billionaire named Dick Uihlein, right? These five front groups also backed Kelly.

Jess Pieklo: I'm sorry, Dick who?

Imani Gandy: Dick Uihlein.

Jess Pieklo: Why have there been so many sex jokes in this episode?

Imani Gandy: I dunno, what's wrong with us? Oh my God. Okay. So Dick Uihlein he's an Illinois-based founder of a shipping company. And he funds a lot of right wing causes through a series of like interlocking political action committees and dark money groups. Now, you may not have heard of him, but you have definitely heard, or probably heard, of another right wing numpty that he supported for a state court election. Jess, do you remember Roy Moore?

Jess Pieklo: Do I remember Roy Moore? Roy Moore, the dude who refused to remove the Ten Commandments from his courtroom, right? The dude whose Senate campaign went tits up after it came out that he used to prey on girls at the mall when he was a lawyer.

Imani Gandy: Gross.

Jess Pieklo: Ew. That Roy Moore? Roy Moore, who was instrumental in advancing "fetal personhood" in Alabama long before anyone else was talking about "fetal personhood" and Amanda Kimbrough.

Imani Gandy: Yeah, Amanda Kimbrough. I was about to say like we've talked about her a lot before. She's the woman that was snatched up by Alabama's chemical endangerment statute, where essentially prosecutors and Roy Moore and the Supreme Court agreed that Amanda Kimbrough's womb was essentially a meth lab. And therefore she had to be sentenced to something like 14 years in prison. Even though the law that they prosecuted her under specifically said that they were not, it was not instituted in order to entrap pregnant people. I mean, it was just, that's Roy Moore. That's Roy Moore. Dick Uihlein is more well known, or maybe most well known, as a primary funder of The Federalist.

Jess Pieklo: Oh.

Imani Gandy: You know the Federalist. Not the Federalist Society. The Federalist.

Jess Pieklo: The publication, The Federalist. Okay. So if our, if viewers and listeners don't know The Federalist, think of it as if the Federalist Society had a fully unedited Reddit, that's basically what it is. It's full of-

Imani Gandy: Fully unedited Reddit.

Jess Pieklo: It's full of everything right wing and masks are completely off. That's The Federalist.

Imani Gandy: That is The Federalist. Dick Uihlein, I'm sorry, but I'm gonna emphasize his name every time I get a chance to say, it's an absurd name. Richard Uihlein also poured millions of dollars into anti-abortion packs associated with the SBA list, right? The Susan B. Anthony List. Regressive anti-abortion numpties. Back in 2021, he and his wife were the fourth largest donor to anti-abortion PACs. Fourth largest donor.

Jess Pieklo: And there are people who give anti-abortion PACs a lot of money, so they must have given those folks a ton of money.

Imani Gandy: A ton of money. Basically, this dude has a lot of money and he decided that he was going to shove anti-abortion policy down the throats of Wisconsinites, even though Wisconsin voters by and large oppose the abortion ban. This jackass from Illinois wanted to come to Wisconsin and just start shit.

Jess Pieklo: Wisconsinites have a very specific term for that. They're called fibs, Wisconsinites will know this, the fucking little bastards.

Imani Gandy: I didn't know that, that's good.

Jess Pieklo: But beyond whether or not Dick Uihlein is a fib, I just, I love Gen Z Imani, you know why? They told Dick to get bent. I'm sorry.

Imani Gandy: Boom!

Jess Pieklo: But look, to my defense, she has been making these jokes all episode and I have been holding that one in, holding that one in.

Imani Gandy: Oh, Jess.

Jess Pieklo: I'm just saying. I'm just saying, look, this election was so important and it's a wonderful outcome because hopefully people in other states where judges are elected can take a page from the Wisconsin playbook and begin to organize in their states. They put abortion and democracy at the center of this campaign. That's one of the things that we're seeing in the exit polling-not only was it Gen Z to save the day, but Democrats absolutely explicitly ran on the link between abortion rights and saving our goddamn democracy, and it worked. Right? And that's because, also, state court elections are so important. So important.

And that's the third thing that we are gonna talk about. Really, state court elections are really, really important people, okay? So you've heard Imani and I talk all episode about just how critical this Wisconsin election was. And that's especially true given the Supreme Court's new salt the earth approach, basically, when it comes to civil and human rights. Like, civil and human rights, who needs 'em, right? The federal judiciary is borked, like, borked, and people now are gonna have to rely on state courts more and more to protect their human and civil rights. That means state courts are the new frontier when it comes to protecting the rights of people of color. LGBTQ folks, rights like reproductive rights, voting rights, the right to be free from discrimination and religious imposition. Increasingly, we are gonna see these become issues of state law and state court battles.

Imani Gandy: And look, ding dongs like Dick, I'm going with it. I'm going with it, ding dongs like Dick don't dump millions into these races for funsies, right? These elections are critical. Conservatives have captured the federal judiciary. Right? And now they're trying to capture state supreme courts through large campaign donations that are not really donations, these donations are not charity.

They are donations that comes with strings attached, you know, sort of, I scratch your back, you scratch mine sort of thing. They're essentially lobbying judges. And that's not something you shouldn't be lobbying judges, like the way that lobbyist lobby politicians on Capitol Hill. That's what's happening with out-of-state actors and state court judges. It's, they're just counting on judges to interpret the law in accordance with regressive conservative principles that screw over everyday people. And you know, now that they finished undermining the public trust in the

federal judiciary and the United States Supreme Court, they're now trying to undermine the public trust in state courts, right? Like, the public trust in the Supreme Court is fucked.

Jess Pieklo: It is.

Imani Gandy: Particularly in light of the news that Clarence Thomas was just taking half milli vacations with his BFF, Harlan Crow, a super billionaire guy who's one of who I think is like the fourth largest donor to the Republican party. Just a real rich guy just sitting in a park at, you know, Harlan Crow's mansion, hanging around with Leonard Leo, the head of the Federalist Society, and a bunch of other jackasses who are associated with the Federalist Society. I mean, Clarence Thomas is a guy who should be impeached, but guess who Republicans in Wisconsin are screaming about impeaching now, our homegirl Janet P.

Jess Pieklo: I was just gonna say, not our lady, Janet, not our, not.

Imani Gandy: Our home girl, our queen, Janet P. She hasn't even done anything yet, like she just, she literally just won. So that shows the sort of bad faith we're talking about here.

Jess Pieklo: Ugh, man, fuck these guys, that's all I gotta say.

Imani Gandy: Fuck these fucking guys. So last thing. I really do wanna just do like a final shout out to Gen Z because look, Jess, this is actually addressed to you.

Jess Pieklo: Oh.

Imani Gandy: In the wake of Dobbs, you spent a lot of time this year talking about radical joy in the face of fascism, right? About how important it is to do this work, not like somberly and so depressed all the time-like, yes, things are dire and there's time to sit with that. But what a better way to face fascism than to be joyful in your organizing, right? And given what we've just laid out about who Daniel Kelly is and who the people who backed him are, I would say that Wisconsinites voted down fascism.

Jess Pieklo: 100%.

Imani Gandy: And they voted it down with a smile on their face, right, if you look at TikTok, it is hard not to tear up watching these kids, these videos of these Gen Z kids not just organizing, but organizing enthusiastically and with joy.

Jess Pieklo: I mean, the number of times that I cried over Gen Z for Change and the college kids out there, like, in front of bars where I used to just get drunk. I wasn't doing anything like political organizing. I was just having some beers and like they did it, they're, it's dancing, it's like just.

Imani Gandy: Costumes.

Jess Pieklo: Yes, it's costumes. It is taking the absurdity of the moment and meeting it with the joy that it needs because like truly the idea that this guy, some like election denier disciple of Pat Robertson and his buddies are now like, we're gonna impeach this lady for winning. For winning. Gen Z, you understand the assignment.

Imani Gandy: They really did and this kind of organization is so critical, right? And everyone can take a page out of Gen Z's playbook, wouldn't you think?

Jess Pieklo: Oh yeah, absolutely. I mean, figure out if judges in your state are elected and if they are, organized with your friends. I don't know, do people still make zines? Make a zine. Make a zine about all of the candidates and where they stand on critical issues like abortion rights, trans rights, environmental rights, and the like. Now, one of our resident Gen Z editors, Natasha, told us that the kids are blogging these days too.

Imani Gandy: Blogging, they're blogging again?

Jess Pieklo: So start a blog.

Imani Gandy: Oh, I love that. I love Gen Z. Start a blog. Ah, I miss blogging actually.

Jess Pieklo: That's how we met, Imani.

Imani Gandy: That is how we met, that's literally how we met. And look, I don't think people are making zines anymore as much as, I mean, zines were so great, part of the counterculture of the '90s when we grew up, lo those many years ago. Right now it's all about TikTok.

Jess Pieklo: Yep.

Imani Gandy: And you know what? The kids are all right, they are using TikTok for good. For change. And I love to see it.

Jess Pieklo: Me too, me too.

Imani Gandy: So let's, what's the cocktail party takeaway of this episode? Like, if you wanna flex on someone and explain to them how you know about what went down in Wisconsin, first, Jess, talk about the generational change between 2011 and 2023.

Jess Pieklo: I mean, really, I sort of teed up earlier, but progressive activists and advocates in the state have not stopped since the Obama years, right? Like, 2010 was the first Tea Party election, for those of us who remember those glory days. They haven't stopped and they haven't stopped in the face of losing election after losing election, after losing election, not for wont of trying, but for excessive gerrymandering. Gen Z was like, hey, there's literally no choice right now, but turn the fuck out. And if you look at the returns from places like Eau Claire,

Wisconsin-it's not just Madison where I'm familiar with. It's all of the places where there are Gen Z pockets. They did it, so that is generations working together. Our Gen X and our elder millennials from 2011 passing the baton to Gen Z, you fucking love to see it.

Imani Gandy: And they are clearly making an impact, right?

Jess Pieklo: Yes.

Imani Gandy: I mean, I saw some guy, some GOP strategist on Twitter the other day, essentially complaining about how the GOP hadn't really gotten its message right on abortion and that everyone should support Lindsay Graham's 15-week ban, because somehow the kids have been indoctrinated with liberalism and believe that the GOP wants to ban abortion without exceptions. Meanwhile, in South Carolina, that's exactly what they're trying to do.

Right, Lindsay Graham is from South Carolina. So this whole idea that they were gonna send abortion back to the states is all horseshit. And now even the GOP seems to understand it because they are freaking out. They're literally claiming that all these Gen Z kids have just been indoctrinated. Brainwashed. And they have to undo the indoctrination. Good luck, mother fuckers 'cause Gen Z is not, did not come to play.

Jess Pieklo: I mean, just look at what went down in Tennessee, right? Like they're 9, 10, 11-year-old kids in that capitol saying, "Fuck you fascists." Right? Like, this is a generation that just doesn't wanna get shot at school, that would like to survive beyond a dying planet. Like, truly.

Imani Gandy: Right and it's also-

Jess Pieklo: It's not that fucking hard, Republicans.

Imani Gandy: It's not that hard. And Gen Z, I mean, they went through it, right? They're partially the lockdown generation. So now that they've sort of been unleashed. Look out world. So that's super exciting, again, Gen Z. Thank you. Thank you so much. And Jess, why don't you tell our listeners and viewers about our live show.

Jess Pieklo: I mean Imani and I live in the same state, but we are actually traveling to Washington, to D.C., to go hang out together. We will be live and in person at the summit for Reproductive Freedom for Boom! Lawyered's 200th episode.

That's like a shimmy. I don't know. You do a shimmy way better than I do in that outfit. That's all I'm gonna say. But we'll be there talking about religious freedom and the Roberts Court in front of a live audience.

Imani Gandy: Woo. It's gonna be amazing. It's gonna be great.

Jess Pieklo: It's gonna be so good. April 22. April 22. That's like soon. Oh my God.

Imani Gandy: It is soon. It's a couple of weeks. And I'm hoping that I'll get to see you twerk in a hotel lobby again, because listeners and viewers, if you've never seen Jess in action, it's a sight to behold. This woman's a rockstar. And on that note, I'll stop embarrassing her.
